On a Monday morning we begin the week by gathering to reflect on the week ahead and pray together. On Wednesday we have Key Stage assemblies and on Thursday, we have Celebration Assembly, when we celebrate the achievements of children from each class.

In class, the children will continue to plan and lead Collective Worship with their teacher on Tuesday, Thursday and Friday.

The children will attend a variety of school masses/services, in Church and in school, throughout the year. The Wednesday Word is available online for each child, every Wednesday. Please look out for this and share it with your child.

Later in the term, each child in the class throughout the year will be given the opportunity to take home a prayer bag, to share in some reflective time with their family.

Healthy School Initiative

As part of the healthy school initiative, we encourage the children to be active at playtimes. We will continue to improve our fitness by completing a 15-minute Daily Mile. Children will be encouraged to increase their ability to jog for this time to run a mile. Running everyday will mean your child will achieve their 100 mile certificate in July!

Information

Big Maths

The children will continue to complete a weekly 'Big Maths' assessment and will be assessed at the end of the half term on their progress.

Each child will continue to keep their Big Maths files in their book bags so that they can share their assessments with you and work on the types of questions that they find more challenging. The children will continue to split into smaller groups and work with a Big Maths teacher once a week.

We will also be continuing to focus on learning our times tables and be rewarding with bronze, silver and gold stickers on our tables charts.

Please encourage your child to use their Maths skills at every opportunity.

Reading

The children will develop their reading in class throughout the week through shared reading and guided reading sessions. I shall be monitoring their reading progress carefully each week with my own records. Our class reader for this half term is 'The Stig of the Dump' by Clive King'

Your child will bring home two books; a reading banded book and a Sharing Book to read and share with you.

Reading Banded Book

The reading banded book, should be at a level the child can read at comfortably and not struggle, with some fluency and understanding. The band will be directed by the Class Teacher. The reading records are for parents to record your child's reading at home. We ask all our children to read for 15 minutes each night. Although I will be keeping my own record of your child's reading progress it would be really helpful if you could make comments in your child's reading record book each time they read, to let me know how they have coped with a book at home. Home reading records are checked regularly.

Sharing book

In order to encourage your child to develop their vocabulary and become a lifelong reader, it is important that they learn to read for pleasure. The sharing book is a book they have chosen for you to enjoy together.

Please remember that you shouldn't expect your child to read this alone. Read it to or with them. Discuss the pictures, enjoy the story, predict what might happen next, use different voices for the characters, explore the facts in a non-fiction book. The main thing is that you have fun!

The school continues to run an early-doors reading and number club (£3) 8am - 8:45am each morning. We ask that children are in the club by 8.20am. Please pre-book, using the form on the 'Our School App'.



RE - Autumn term topics

Homes: To know and understand the joys and sorrows of being a family at home and God's vision for ever family.

Promises: To know and understand that belonging in a group involves promises and rules and the meaning of the promises made at Baptism.

Judaism: The children will learn about some different aspects of the Jewish faith.

English**Reading**

- Children will read a range of Traditional Tales & Fables and analyse texts including recounts and instructions, in order to write in different styles.

Writing

- Write a traditional tale.
- Write a recount.
- Write and evaluate a range of instructions.
- Write, perform and recite poetry in the form of limericks.

Grammar and Punctuation

- Understand the formation of nouns using prefixes and word families.
- Use a range of conjunctions, adverbs and prepositions.
- Introduction to paragraphs, headings and sub-headings to aid presentation and group related information.
- Use of the present perfect form.
- Introduction to inverted commas to punctuate direct speech.

Spelling

- Recap of high frequency words from KS1.
- To learn Year 3 spelling lists and use dictionaries to find meanings and create new lists of words with similar spelling patterns.

Handwriting

- Join words and understand which letters are best left un-joined.

Science- What do Scientists do?

- Identify the steps involved in the scientific method.
- Generate enquiry questions and make careful observations.
- Plan a comparative fair test.
- Draw conclusions from careful observations.
- Create a hypothesis and plan an investigation.
- Conduct a practical experiment, record findings and draw conclusions.

Maths**Number and Place Value**

- Read and write numbers up to 1000 in numerals and in words.
- Recognise the place value of each digit in a three-digit number (hundreds, tens, and units).
- Solve number problems and practical problems involving these ideas. (NRICH- a maths website).

Addition and Subtraction

- Add and subtract numbers with up to three digits, using formal written methods of column addition and subtraction.
- Estimate the answer to a calculation and use inverse operations to check answers.
- Solve problems, including missing number problems, using number facts, place value, and more complex addition and subtraction.

Multiplication and Division

- Count from 0 in multiples of 4, 8, 50 and 100 and find 10 or 100 more or less than a given number.

Shape

- Draw 2-D shapes.
- Measure the perimeter of simple 2D shapes.

Data

- Interpret and present data using bar charts, pictograms and tables.
- Solve one-step and two-step questions [for example, 'How many more?' and 'How many fewer?'] using information presented in scaled bar charts and pictograms and tables.

PE

Tuesday and Thursday

Children will be working on the key aspects of PE such as Balance and Co-ordination. They will incorporate these focuses into a variety of activities and games.

PE Uniform - plain white t-shirt, royal blue shorts, dark coloured, plain navy sweatshirt (no hood) and jogging pants. Trainers will also be needed.

Please ensure children come to school in their PE Uniform on PE days.

PSHE- Families and Friendships

The children will:

- Recognise and respect different types of families, including single parents, same-sex parents, stepparents, blended families, foster and adoptive parents.
- Being part of a family provides support, stability and love.
- Positive aspects of being part of a family, such as spending time together and caring for each other.
- Different ways that people can care for each other e.g. giving encouragement or support in times of difficulty.
- Identify if/when something in a family might make someone upset or worried.
- What to do and whom to tell if family relationships are making them feel unhappy or unsafe.

RSE - Journey in Love

To describe and give reasons how friendships make us feel happy and safe.

Prehistoric Art

The children will have opportunities to: Experiment with charcoal, berries, leaves and homemade paints. Children will get a sense of what it is like to create art thousands of years ago and why they were created.

- Pupils should be taught to develop their techniques, including their control and their use of materials, with creativity, experimentation and an increasing awareness of different kinds of art, craft and design.
- Improve their mastery of art and design techniques, including drawing, painting and sculpture, for example, pencil, charcoal, paint, clay.

Topic Title

The Stone Age

Computing

Coding

Children will:

- Review previous decoding knowledge.
- Understand flow charts.
- Understand different types of timers.
- Understand how to use the repeat command.
- Use coding knowledge to create a range of programs.
- Understand the importance of nesting.
- Create an interactive scene.

History - Who first lived in Britain?

Changes in Britain from the Stone Age to the Iron Age (including the Bronze Age)

- Understand that a timeline can be divided into BC (Before Christ) and AD (Anno Domini).
- Use a timeline to place historical events in chronological order and have an understanding that the Stone Age is prehistoric.
- Be able to describe the different ways of life that are associated with the Stone Age
- Explain how archaeologists used a great variety of artefacts to create an understanding on how ancient Britons lived.
- Describe the features of Stone Age summer and winter camps and understand why they were needed.
- Compare and contrast the difference between historical facts (what we know are true) and historical supposition (assumptions we make).
- Discuss and explain some of important ways in which life changed during the Stone Age.

Music

Using 'Charanga', the children will learn how music is created. They will be learning to sing an R and B song called 'Let your Spirit Fly'. They will:

- Confidently listen and appraise pieces of music.
- Find the pulse, rhythm and pitch.
- Sing in unison and in two parts.
- Rehearse and perform with a glockenspiel.

The children will also listen to and appreciate a range of music from around the world and sing every day.
